

Unit: Asking difficult questions: Buddhism: What do Buddhists believe about the consequences of actions?

About this unit

In this unit Learners will learn the terms karma and samsara. They will understand the consequences of their action and evaluate the Buddhist view of the consequences of our actions. They will evaluate the significance of Buddha's teachings on the consequences of actions on Buddhists, with reference to the six perfections and how a Buddhists' actions might differ according to the community they belong to.
