1. Purpose and Reasons

- 1.1 To consider references from the meeting of the Health and Wellbeing Board held on 15th March 2017 that the following strategies be adopted:
 - 1.1.1 Health and Wellbeing Strategy Refresh 2017
 - 1.1.2 Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy 2017-2022
- 1.2 The references support the Council's Vision Priority Four: "Help people to help themselves while always protecting our most vulnerable children and adults".

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 Cabinet is recommended to adopt the "Health and Wellbeing Strategy Refresh 2017" and the "Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy 2017-2022".

3. Detail

References from the Health and Wellbeing Board

- 3.1 At its meeting on 15th March 2017, the Health and Wellbeing Board considered a report from the Director of Public Health regarding the refresh of the Swindon's Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2017 – 2022. This was informed by the needs of its population outlined in its JSNAs, and also how the Swindon Clinical Commissioning Group, NHS England, and Swindon Borough Council plans for commissioning services are expected to be informed by the Health and Wellbeing Strategy and the JSNA.
- 3.2 The Board resolved –
 - 3.2.1 (1) That the refreshed Health and Wellbeing Strategy for 2017 – 2022, attached at Appendix 1 to the report, be adopted.
 - 3.2.2 (2) That the proposal to engage further with local communities and residents to ensure our shared vision and proprieties are relevant and proportionate to local opinions be supported.

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3.2.3 (3) That the Cabinet and the Governing Body of the Swindon Clinical Commissioning Group be recommended to adopt the refreshed Health and Wellbeing Strategy for 2017 – 2022

- 3.3 The Health and Wellbeing Board also considered the Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy for 2017 – 2022, setting out how, over the next five years, partners will work together across Swindon to reduce the number of people who smoke and the harm caused by tobacco use and create a smokefree Swindon. The Strategy will also ensure that partners continue to work collaboratively to protect and improve the health of the population and future generations in the creation of a smokefree Swindon.
- 3.4 The Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy for 2017 – 2022 states five priorities for tobacco control work in Swindon:
- Priority 1: Protect children and prevent young people from taking up smoking.
 - Priority 2: Normalise a smokefree lifestyle.
 - Priority 3: Support smokers to quit.
 - Priority 4: Reduce illicit tobacco in the community
 - Priority 5: Raise the profile of tobacco control through marketing and communications programmes
- 3.5 Reducing health inequalities is a major priority in Swindon and whilst not listed as a separate priority in this strategy, it is a cross cutting theme which features in all of the priorities.
- 3.6 Swindon Borough Council implemented a new Smoking and Vaping at Work Policy in March 2017. The policy conforms to the requirements of smokefree legislation and smoking is only permitted outside in designated areas. Smoking is defined clinically and in law and e-cigarette use does not meet the definition in either context. E-cigarette use is often known as ‘vaping’ and vaping is permitted on Council premises , but not in workplaces or vehicles.
- 3.7 The Board resolved:
- 3.7.1 1) That the Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy 2017 – 2022, attached at Appendix 1 to the report, be approved and the ongoing focus on tobacco control work in Swindon be supported.
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3.7.2 (2) That the Cabinet and the Clinical Commissioning Group Governing Body be recommended to adopt the Swindon Tobacco Control Strategy 2017 – 2022.

3.7.3 (3) That the development of the action plan associated with this Strategy, which will be monitored by the Swindon Smokefree Alliance (the Swindon tobacco control partnership of key stakeholders), be supported.
